1 - Everyone under 18 has these rights














Regardless of age, gender, abilities and disabilities all our young people have equal rights in whatever environment they are living, working and playing.

Jack chose to hold his Leavers party at his favourite location as having it at Endeavour would have been too challenging.














While peers were choosing brightly coloured decorations for the Leaver's Ball Sasha chose white plates, so these were used at the event.


6 – I should be supported to live and grow











7 – I have a right to a name and to belong to a country














8 – I have a right to an identify

14 – I have the right to have my own thoughts and beliefs and to choose my religion, with my parents' guidance

17 – I have a right to get information in lots of ways, so long as it's safe

Staff regularly undertake trainings including Team Teach, Safeguarding and Autism Awareness.

19 – I have the right to be protected from being hurt or badly treated













Endeavour House staff are dedicated to the care of their young people.

Bedrooms are personalised safe, private spaces in contrast to the bright communal areas.



20 – I have the right to special protection and help if I can't live with my own family

Staff support students to engage in a wide range of health care appointment and activities to teach them how to live healthy, active lives.

Endeavour House team meetings enable staff to discuss young people's feelings and check activities are suitable and enjoyable.

Photos like this are shared with family during visits or via phone / email.


25 – If I am not living with my family, people should keep checking I am safe and happy











Our Family Footings Facilitator offers support and advice to families to enable them to access money they are entitled to to help them bring up their children.

26 - My family should get the money they need to help bring me up















27 – I have the right to have a proper house, food and clothing















Endeavour staff taking learning activities to students wherever they prefer to work to help reduce anxiety and sensory overload & maximise engagement and learning opportunities.

28 – I have the right to an education











Older students act as role models for younger students. Angel's work experience involved serving peers snack in the school Hub.

29 – I have the right to an education which develops my personality, respect for others' rights and the environment











Endeavour are working with Catherine's parents to find a communication system that enables her to effectively communicate at school and at home.

30 – I have a right to speak my own language and to follow my family's way of life













Reflexology, SEN golf and time with chosen peers are great ways to relax and play after learning activities.



31 – I have a right to relax and play















Developing work experience skills within Endeavour prepare our young people for community work experience in future years. This includes car washing, gardening, catering, and admin tasks.

32 – I should not be made to do dangerous work













It is important for all our young people to learn to say 'No' and express their dislikes as well as their likes.

33 – I should be protected from dangerous drugs













Through RSE sessions students learn about their bodies and how to keep them private.

34 – Nobody should touch me in ways that make me feel uncomfortable, unsafe or sad













Trips in the community are a great opportunity to practice road safety and learn how to keep safe in unfamiliar environments.


36 – I have the right to be kept from things that could harm my development














Endeavour acknowledge that it can be upsetting when incidents happen. Our young people are supported by trained staff to understand what has happened and how it can be repaired in a supportive way.

37 – I have the right not to be punished in a cruel or hurtful way









Jerald is supported, by a trusted adult, to learn to sit calmly and wait for next activity after an unsettled period.





Jessica is supported with sensory activities and music after being upset.

39 - I have the right to help if I have been hurt, neglected or badly treated











Staff are trained in Team Teach and use de-escalation strategies to reduce the need for physical intervention. A caring touch or guiding hand can provide the reassurance needed to support a young person to understand a change in routine or complete a transition.

40 – I have the right to legal help and to be treated fairly if I have been accused of breaking the law

41 – Where our country treats us better than the UN does we should keep up the good work!



















42 – Everyone should know about the UNCRC
